Pastor Brian Janes performed the Invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

1. Quarterly Board of Health Meeting Update

Public Health Director Dwayne Smith started with asking that those who have health conditions should take extra precautions when our air quality is poor. Mr. Smith discussed briefly water quality notifications that he has received regarding local water districts. Mr. Smith provided information on the current status of COVID-19 in Elbert County. Mr. Smith stated that since tracking began in March 2020, the County has had 9,594 Residents tested, 1,982 Confirmed cases, 132 Hospitalizations and 15 Fatalities. Mr. Smith said that they have made an offer to a Public Health Nurse and are waiting to hear back from them.



Environmental Health Specialist Stacey Rinehart provided an update on the septic permits, septic revenues, food licenses and food license revenue through the second quarter. Ms. Rinehart provided information regarding rabies and how to have a suspected animal tested.

Maggie Witherbee, 44447 Homestead, Elizabeth. Ms. Witherbee thanked Dwayne Smith for doing a good job with the information he is being given. Ms. Witherbee brought up Dr. Dan Stock and his speech at a school board meeting. Ms. Witherbee stated that Dr. Stock provided information that destroyed COVID-19 in about 6 mins. Ms. Witherbee stated that the information we are receiving from the Government is not true.

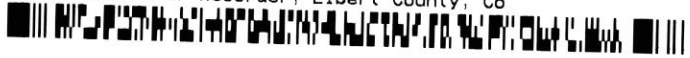

F. ELECTED OFFICIALS/DEPARTMENT HEADS/STAFF REPORTS

Public Works Director Rory Hale provided an update on the new Public Works Facility. Mr. Hale said the design development is between July and September and they have met with a potential contractor. Mr. Hale went over the proposed layout of the building on the new lot and feels this will help a lot with efficiencies. Mr. Hale provided an update on noxious weed spraying and the herbicide they use.

County Manager Sam Albrecht introduced the new Director of Emergency Management Shane Pynes.

G. CITIZEN PUBLIC COMMENT

Greg Gustafson, 6233 Arrowhead Trl. Elizabeth. Mr. Gustafson stated that he is the Chair of the Elbert County Sheriff's Citizen Board and that they meet once a month. Mr. Gustafson said that some of the feedback they have received is that residents want animal control and more deputies on the road. Mr. Gustafson said that failure to heed to the Sheriff's requests leads him to question the Commissioners.

H. DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. Consideration of Sheriff's Proposed Ballot Measure to Fund the Justice Center Improvements

Elbert County Sheriff Tim Norton stated that he was hesitant to give the presentation after last week's workshop. Mr. Norton stated that this has been in talks now for a year and the Commissioners have been very firm on what the money can be used on. Mr. Norton said that they want to use it to pay for all deputies, animal control, etc. Mr. Norton stated that their main concern is our people and the need for more deputies. Mr. Norton said that they cannot afford to wait, and they need the ballot measure for the 1% Sales and Use Tax. Mr. Norton read a statement and stated that if he does not get all that he is asking for he will not support it.

Commissioner Richardson stated that this has been discussed for two years now and we all have to look at the big picture. Mr. Richardson stated that a 1% Sales and Use Tax will not fully fund the Sheriff's Office and if there is excess money, you must ask the voters to use it.

Public Comment:

Maggie Witherbee, 44447 Homestead, Elizabeth. Ms. Witherbee is with Elbert County Stand Up and would like the Commissioners to reconsider the ballot wording. Ms. Witherbee feels the biggest issue is the lack of trained professional deputies and that we have become a training center. Ms. Witherbee feels that the deputies would stay if we paid them more.



Bonnie Yost, 3503 Antelope Cir. Elizabeth. Ms. Yost expressed those new buildings are great, but we also need the manpower. Ms. Yost feels we need to train and pay more so they stay and feel supported.

Chris Grace, 45720 Kitty Hawk, Parker. Mr. Grace supports the Sheriff's need and wants to make sure the money goes only to the Sheriff's Office.

Kelly Jerrold, 28499 County Rd 45, Kiowa. Ms. Jerrold thanked the Commissioners for the County Fair. Ms. Jerrold was surprised to see a recall group to recall the Commissioners. Ms. Jerrold is interested in money that has gone elsewhere. Ms. Jerrold brought up the Constitutional Proclamation recently signed and that we can't lose our "Constitutional" Sheriff at this time.

Tim Adair, 3436 Antelope Ridge, Parker. Mr. Adair has lived in Elbert County for about a year. Mr. Adair supports Elbert County Stands Up and the Sheriff's Office. Mr. Adair stated that we need to pay our deputies more so they will stay.

Deanna Schott, 45720 Kitty Hawk, Parker. Ms. Schott stated that she recently moved to Elbert County on purpose, specifically for the people. Ms. Schott unfortunately had to have an interaction with the Sheriff's Office, and they were the most impeccable people to have around.

Ken Cardwell, 22479 Eagle Dr. Elbert. Mr. Cardwell stands behind the Sheriff's Office and we have to let the people vote.

Steve Buck, 10933 County Rd 120, Kiowa. Mr. Buck has been out here for 30 years. Mr. Buck stands behind the Sheriff's Office and stated that the deputies need to live and work here.

Steve Allison, 33991 Wolf Creek Trl, Kiowa. Mr. Allison said he wanted to give love to the Commissioners because you can't make everyone happy. Mr. Allison said we need to take care of our departments, as a retired division chief he understands the need for money and retention in our community.

Commissioner Richardson stated that this was a complicated premise. Commissioner Richardson stated that they asked for this information back in June. Commissioner Richardson said this will allow for deputy pay but it will take years before there is any extra money for anything like animal control.

Commissioner Thayer said this allows an extra \$2,000,000 in the general fund. Commissioner Thayer stated that a 20% increase was just given to everyone at the Sheriff's Office. Commissioner Thayer said that there is not one Commissioner that doesn't realize the need for a new jail, but they have to be responsible for the budget.

Commissioner Pettitt said that everyone wants to see this succeed but we need to see specifics on the ballot question and how to use and implement the funds. Commissioner Pettitt stated it will take years before there are any extra funds and they will need to save a years' worth of payments immediately.



There was a discussion at length on how to present this to the public for a vote.

Undersheriff Dave Fisher presented the slideshow.

2. Discussion Regarding Policy for Placing Items on the Ballot

County Clerk Dallas Schroeder would like to see a policy in regard to placing items on the ballot. Mr. Schroeder explained that the BOCC is the only entity allowed to place issues on the County ballot. Mr. Schroeder stated that a policy will put in place a deadline to make sure things get into place on time. Mr. Schroeder explained that if there is not a County or State issue on the ballot, some residents will not receive a ballot in those years. Mr. Schroeder would like the policy to make it clear on how and when something can be place on the ballot and a committee to put the policy together that consists of a BOCC rep, Clerk, Attorney and County Manager.

Commissioner Thayer asked if there was a draft yet.

Commissioner Pettitt liked the committee idea.

Commissioner Richardson agreed.

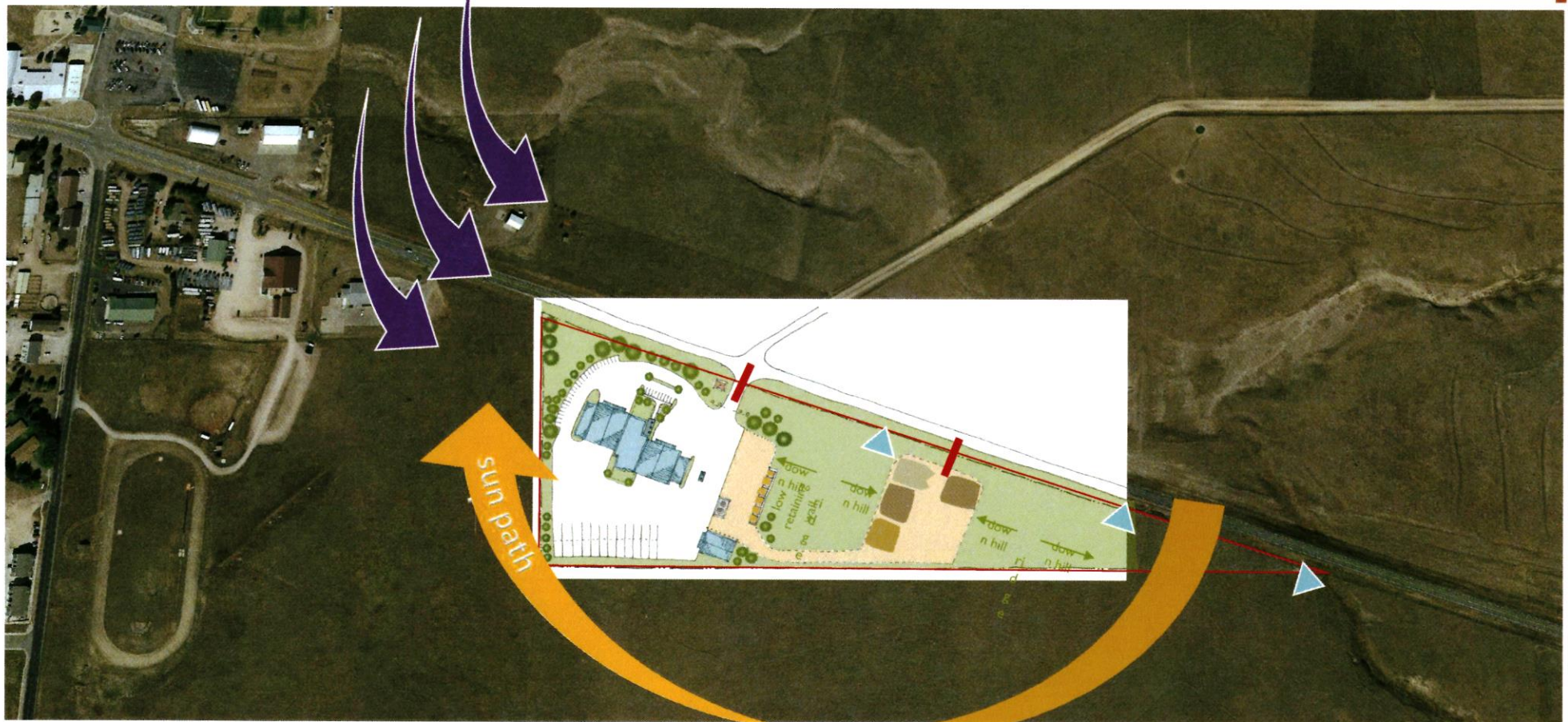

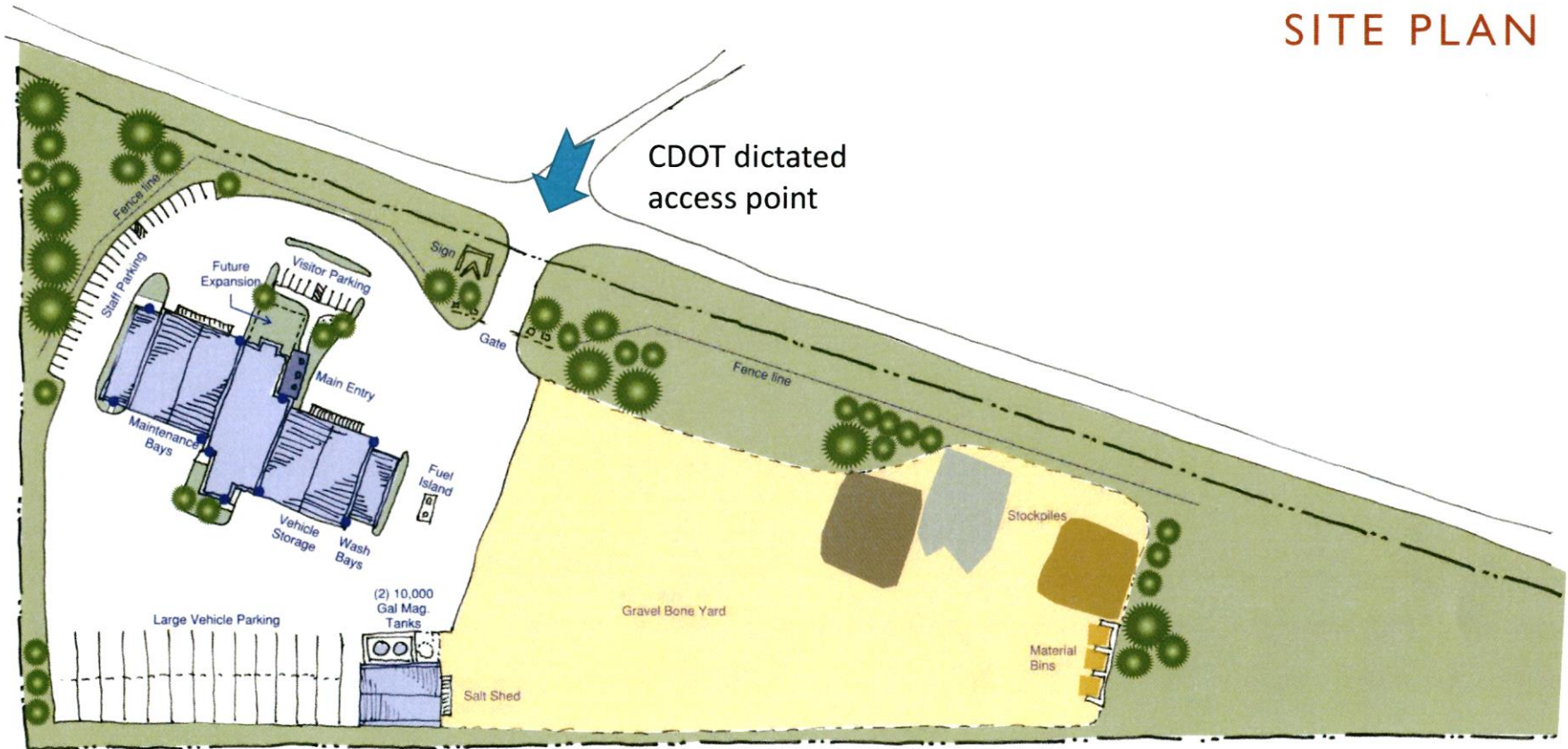

FLOOR PLAN



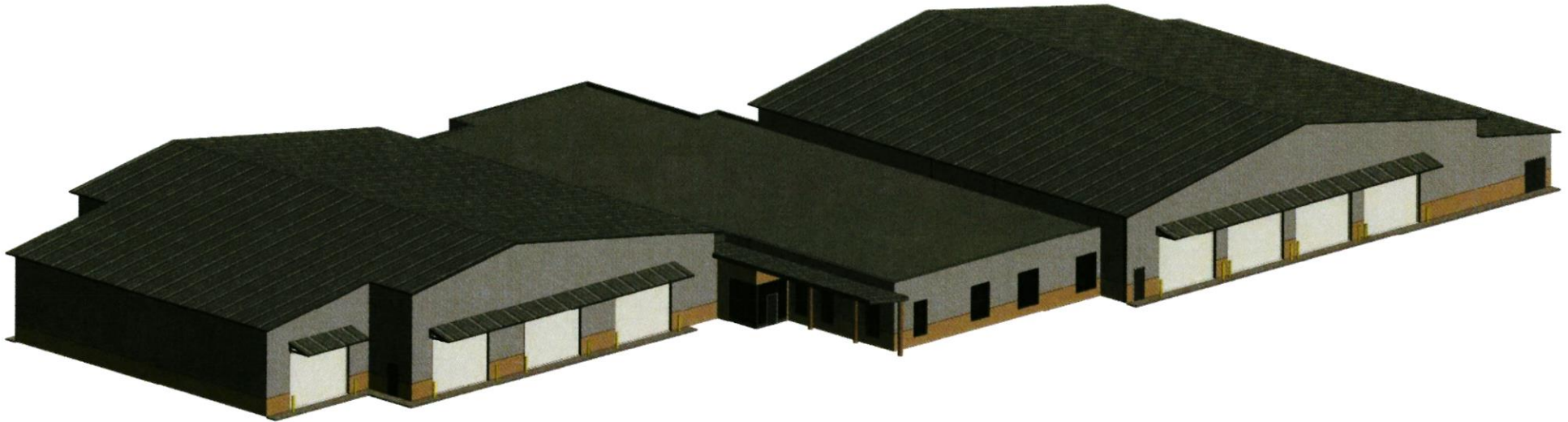

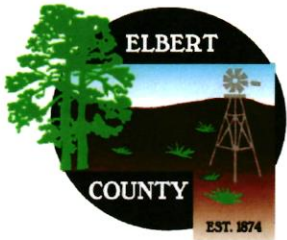




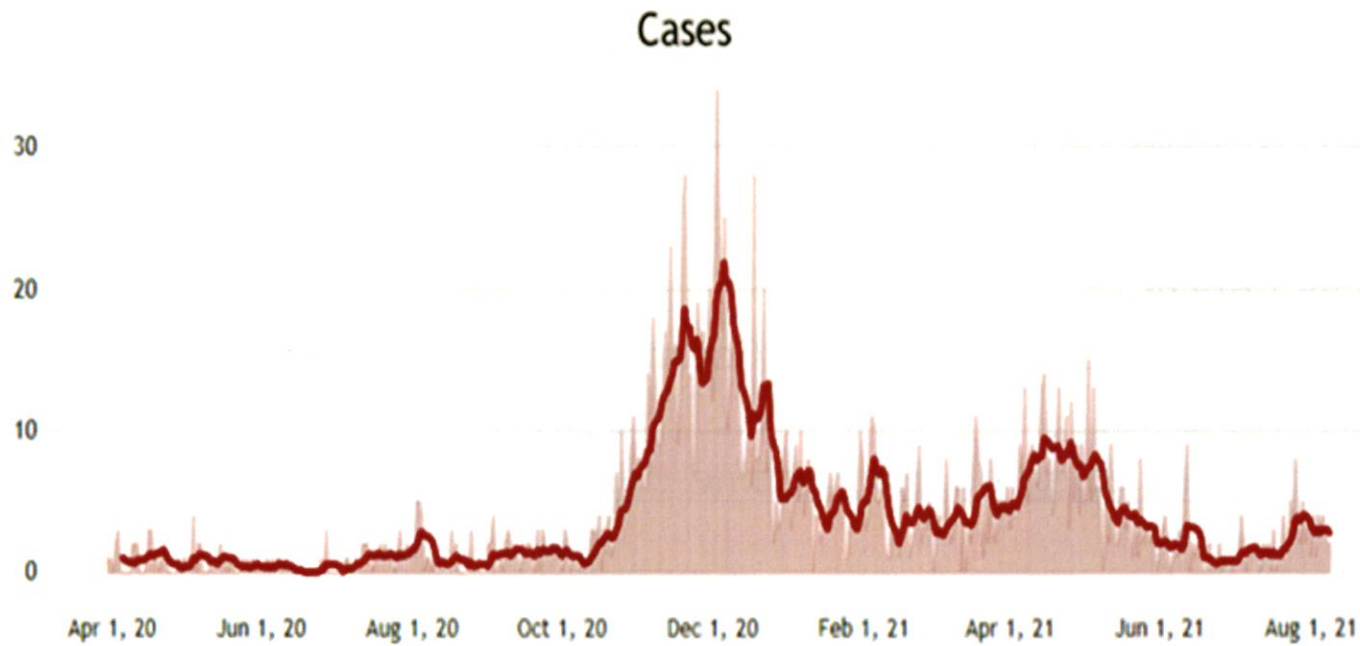
Current Status of COVID-19 in Elbert County (as of 8/11/2021)

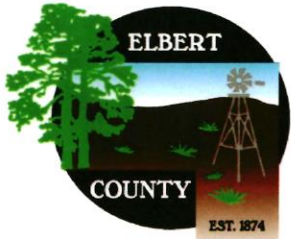
After a period of declining and low volumes and rates of infections in June and mid-July, metrics have been steadily increasing since then.

- 9,594 residents have been tested since tracking began in March 2020
- 1,982 confirmed infections
- 132 hospitalizations (10 in the past two weeks)
- 15 fatalities among cases
- 2-Week Cumulative Incidence Rate: 149.89 cases per 100,000 (40 cases)
- 2-Week Average Positivity: 8.46%

 - Ages 65+: 70.6%
 - Ages 18+: 48.6%
 - 20,467 doses

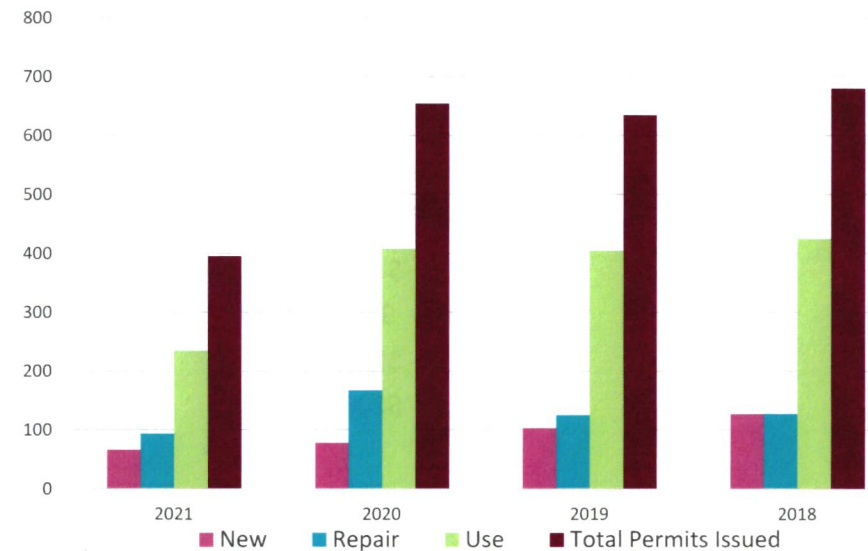

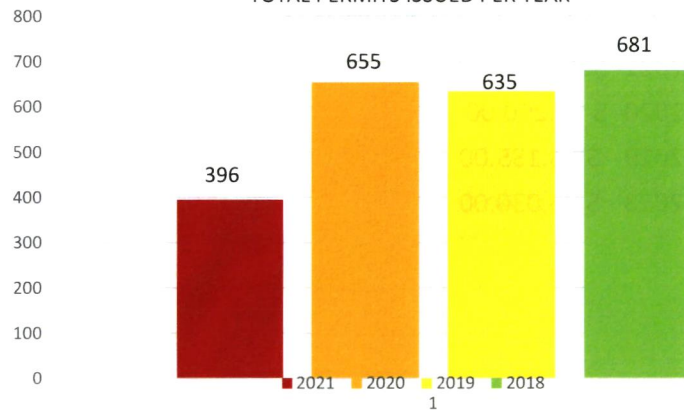

TOTAL PERMITS ISSUED PER YEAR

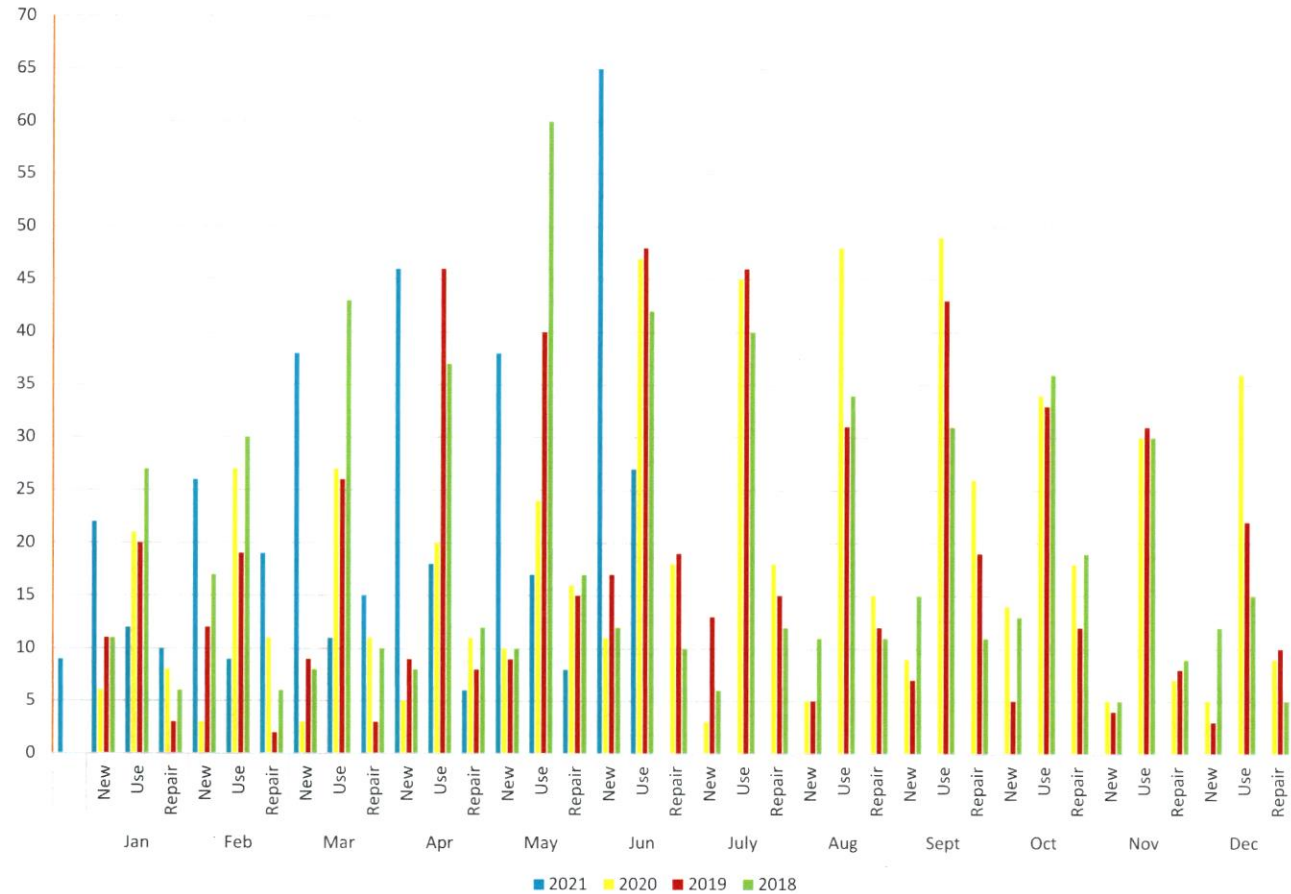

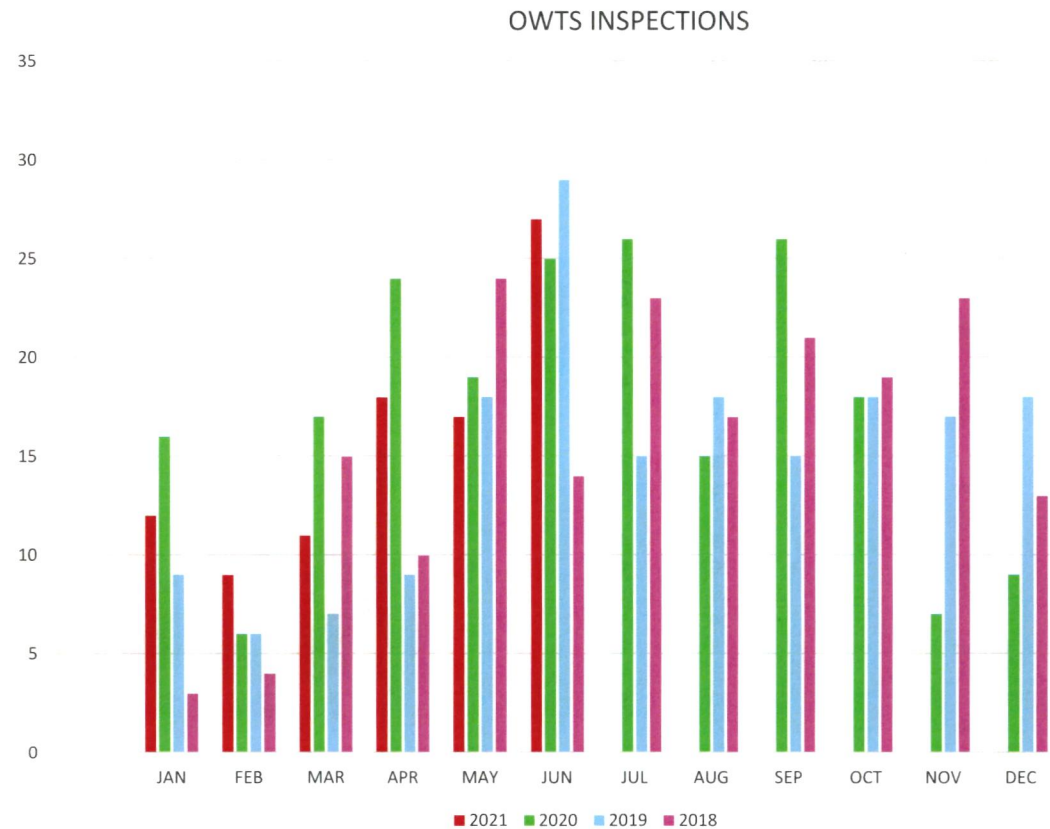

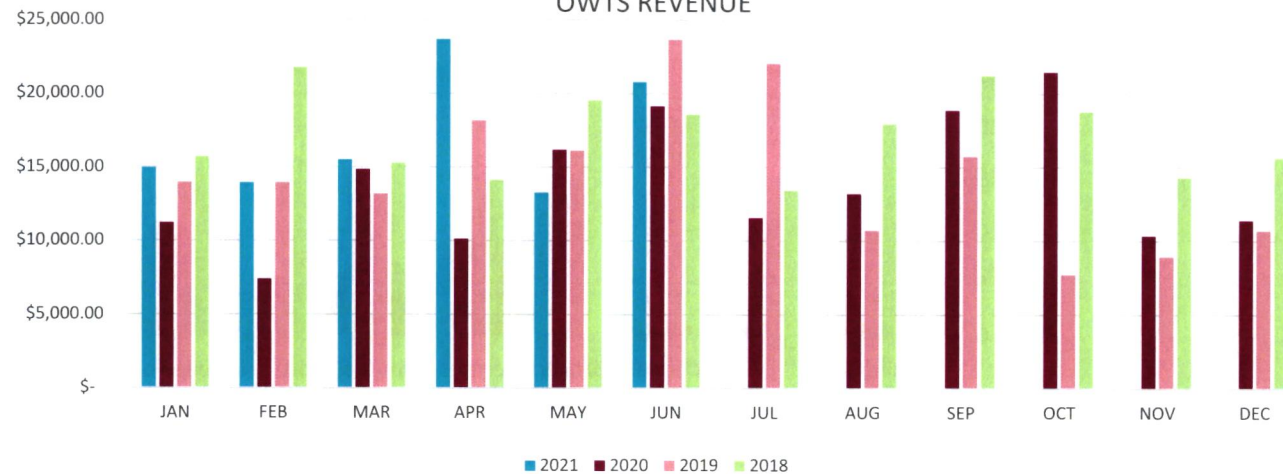

TOTAL YEARLY REVENUE



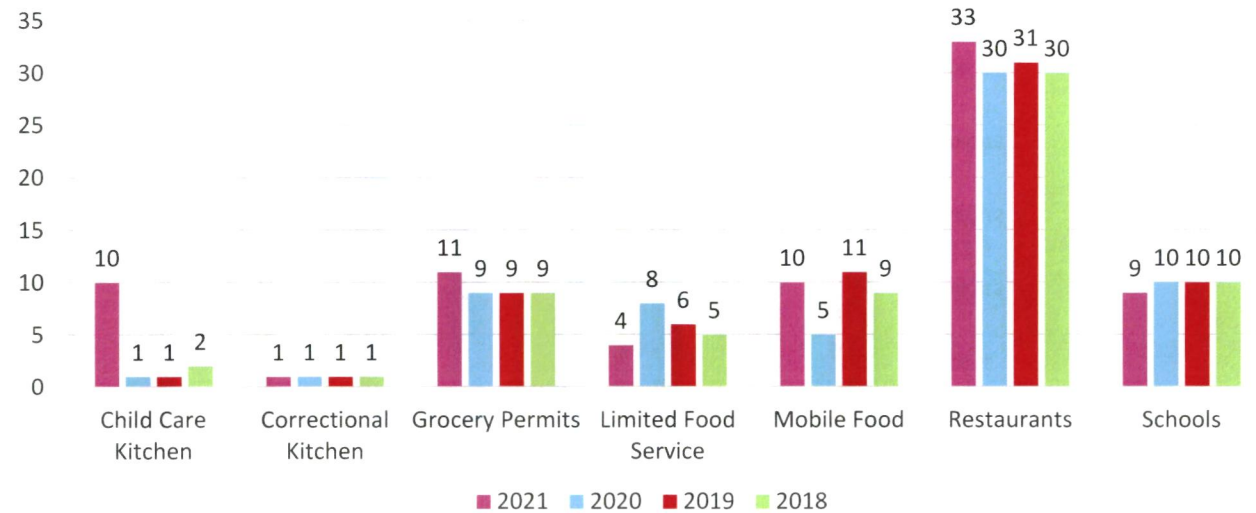

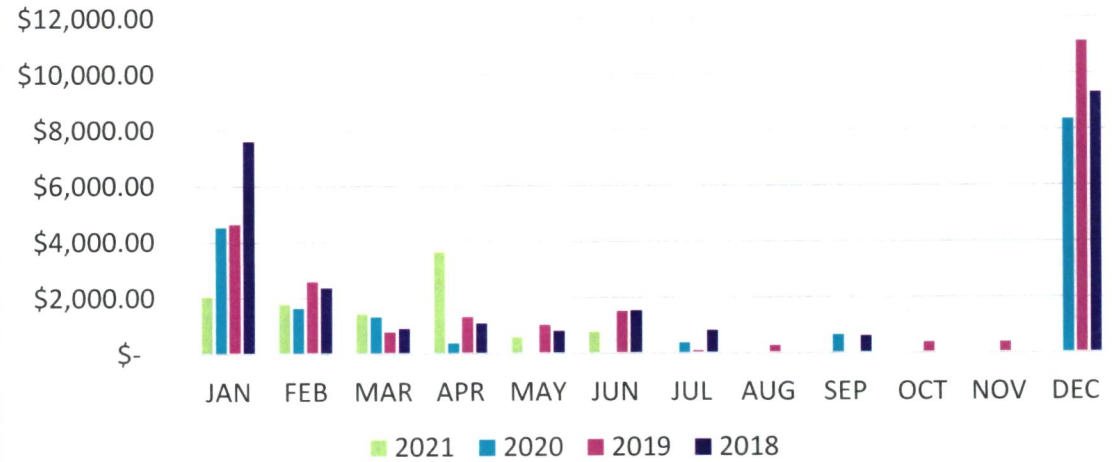




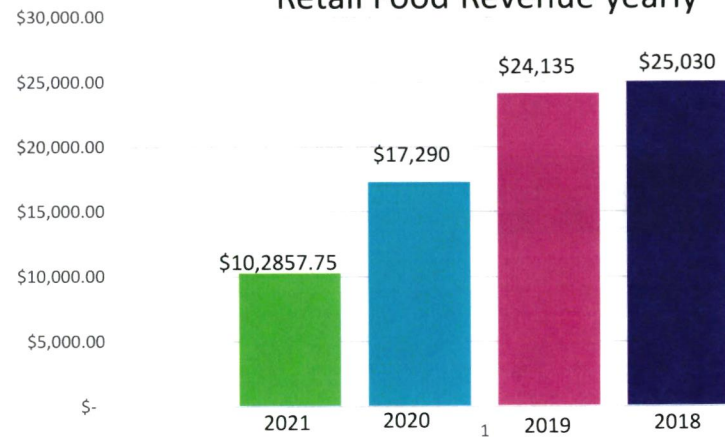

Rabies in Colorado

Rabies is regularly found in Colorado wildlife (especially skunks and bats) - even in urban areas. Wild and domestic animals are monitored and tested if they show signs of rabies. These data help determine rabies risk throughout the state.

Rabies is a serious threat to humans and animals. Lab-based monitoring helps prevent cases in people, control the spread of rabies in animals, make treatment decisions when humans have been exposed, manage animals that might have been exposed, and add to the knowledge of the disease presence in Colorado.

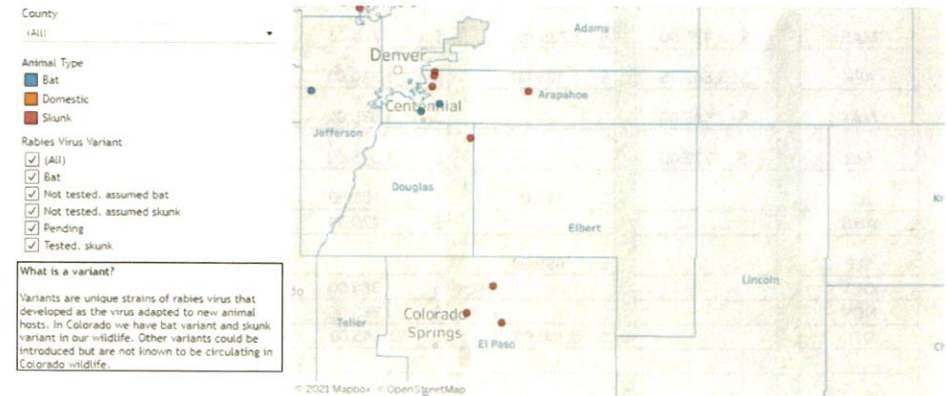

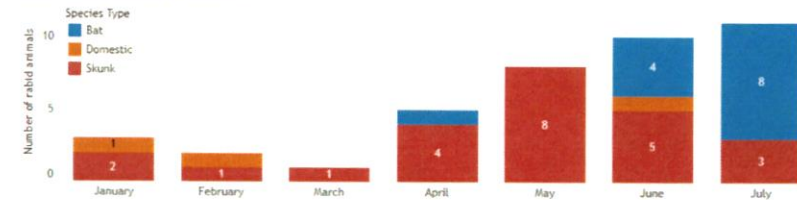


2021 case locations

Rabid **bats** are more likely to be found in the late summer when maternity colonies are breaking up and juvenile bats are emerging.
